

Black Child National Agenda

A new brief published by the Office of Planning, Research, and Evaluation describes practices from across the human services field that can inspire novel approaches to engaging families during program improvement, especially in Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and child support programs. The brief highlights key findings from a scan of academic and non-academic literature, including guidebooks and frameworks, related to collecting and using family input in human services programs. It also includes findings from discussions with program leaders from state, local, and Tribal human services agencies that collect and apply families' input to their program operations.
